Whitireia and WelTec unite programmes to create new Te Ao Māori performing arts group

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Whitireia and WelTec have established a new interdisciplinary group called Ngā Toi to unite Māori and Pacific performing arts and music within Te Wānanga Māori.

"The creation of Ngā Toi enables a roopu (unit) that will bring together creative and performing arts within a Māori-led ecosystem," says Jeanette Grace, Dean of Te Wānanga Māori at Whitireia.

The new group, created following consultation and feedback, will be based at the Whitireia Porirua campus and will deliver the following programmes:

New Zealand Certificate in Performing Arts (Level 3) incorporating performing arts and music

New Zealand Certificate in Music (Level 4)

New Zealand Diploma in Performing Arts (Level 6) (Māori and Pacific Dance).

"Ngā Toi upholds the vocational education ethos to engage ākonga (students) with learning, develop self-confidence, link back to cultural whakapapa, and enable success," says Mark Oldershaw, Manahautū Executive Director at Whitireia and WelTec. "It also presents an opportunity to grow an interdisciplinary performing arts group with strong kaupapa and retain the level 3 and 4 music programmes within this newly established group." Ngā Toi will be co-located in the current facilities used by Māori and Pacific Performing Arts at Whitireia in Porirua. A kawenata (governance group) led by the Dean of Te Wānanga Māori and including the Chief Advisor Pacific and Head of the School of Creative and Hospitality will oversee the new unit.

"We endeavour to shape our practice and delivery to facilitate learning and success in the Wellington region, and our flexible approach responds to needs and maximises accessibility to vocational education for ākonga (students) in our region," said Mr Oldershaw.

Māori and Pasifika strand

Introduction to Māori and Pasifika Performing Arts

To introduce students to basic vocal and movement skills for Māori and Pasifika performance genres, and to work in the performing arts industry which include health and safety practices.

Māori and Pasifika Technique Studies

To develop students' basic skills in Māori and Pasifika performance techniques, ability to prepare for presentation to an audience and establishment of a routine practice schedule.

Ensemble Workshop

To develop students' ability to prepare in an ensemble for performance, taking responsibility for both personal performance and interpersonal communication and collaboration.

Ensemble Performance

To develop students' performance skills and extend their learning from other courses into performances for audiences.

Music strand

Introduction to Music

To introduce students to theoretical elements of music that contribute to playing a musical instrument, and to introduce students to work in the music industry which include learning health and safety practices.

Introduction to Music Instrument Studies

To develop basic skills in playing a musical instrument (in this course, the voice is included as an instrument), ability to prepare for presentation to an audience and establishment of a routine practice schedule.

Ensemble Workshop

To develop students' ability to prepare in an ensemble for performance, taking responsibility for both personal performance and interpersonal communication and collaboration.

Ensemble Performance

To develop students' performance skills and extend their learning from other courses into performances for audiences.

Career outcomes

This qualification may lead to employment of selfemployment as a novice performer in the performing arts industry such as a musician or dance performer.

Graduates will be able to use the skills learned from this programme and apply them in cultural performance-based contexts within their community.

Graduates can also pathway on to the New Zealand Diploma in Performing Arts – Māori and Pacific Dance,
